Looking Back – We had a good year. The NOLA Staff has emerged into a "lean team machine". We worked together, we worked harder, we worked with less financial resources and I believe that we served the NOLA membership better than ever. Here are a few of our many accomplishments:

- Grew the membership to 93 libraries
- NOLAVision Installed Video Conferencing Equipment First Regional to video conference with SLO at Board Meetings – First Regional to use video conferencing in CE programs – First Regional to Stream video instruction to membership – first Regional to produce streaming video programs – Developed the Performers Showcase video project
- Received the OPLIN Award for Innovation for the LISTENOhio program that now has over 1500 title.
- Held Legislative Forums and a Legislative Brunch to build a strong relationship with the legislators serving the NOLA community.
- · Developed and proposed the Regional Wholesale/Retail agreement between Regionals.
- Expanded AskUsQuestions to 21 libraries.
- Implemented and completed the LSTA Grant Mother Goose Early Literacy Outreach Project.
- Implemented the NOLA Poster Printer Service.
- Held the largest ever Youth Services Symposium with 128 attendees.
- Worked with SLO, OLC and the Regional Library Systems to coordinate CE and a statewide CE Calendar.
- Saved the NOLA membership over \$ 108,500.00 by implementing a group purchase of electronic databases.
- Completed the 2002 Salary Survey with 153 libraries participating.
- Renewed the NOLA Health Insurance Program for 2003.
- · Created the NOLA Listserv and email hosting service.

We were able to do these things because you the membership identified need, supported innovation, encouraged creativity and actively participated in NOLA activities. The NOLA Board of Trustee supported Team NOLA by providing resources, encouraging new ideas and taking risks.

Looking Forward – 2003 already appears to be a year of *change, transitions, and new beginnings*. Many will see the budget issues as the biggest challenge. Certainly we cannot operate with out money, but I believe the greater challenge will be to continue to be the productive *lean team machine* we are. Looking Under the Hood of Performer's Showcase

By the time that many of you read this you'll be receiving email and other promotional materials announcing one of

NOLA's newest projects – The Performer's Showcase. I thought many of you out there in techie-land might find it useful and interesting to know how Showcase works, and to know a bit about some of the technologies behind the project.

Showcase centers around the delivery of streaming video clips showing performers from across the state demonstrating their skills and providing libraries with a chance to view a performer before making a decision whether to book them for a show. We looked at a number of streaming video technologies such as Real, Windows Media, and Quicktime Streaming before deciding on the use of the MPEG4 format.

The question of format

In the end we felt that MPEG4 provided us with a standards-based format, the ability to produce a large, good-quality video image with a reasonable use of bandwidth and the existence of an Active-X control that would allow us to embed the content within a webpage so that users wouldn't have to launch an external application to view the video clips. Our only reservation about the use of MPEG4 was that the format is currently supported by a limited number of video players and that users will need to have Quicktime 6.0 or higher loaded to access the content.

Speed and quality

Since our target audience is library staff members who will be accessing the system through fast network links we had a good deal of flexibility, thus the videos in showcase are all 320x240 pixels, 24 frames per second, and are designed to stream on a connection of 384K or faster. If we were designing this project for home use we'd have to cut down the size of clips (160x120 would be likely), reduce frame rate and degrade the quality of the video image to create a clip that could stream over a 56K dialup connection.

Delivery

Once we selected format, the next element of the project to examine was the delivery of the video content to the end user. Two major options exist for delivering streaming video – TCP based delivery using HTTP and UDP based delivery using a protocol like RTSP. Both delivery systems have advantages and drawbacks, delivery via HTTP will work in nearly any environment; however it isn't as robust and doesn't degrade well due to network congestion. RTSP delivery can be affected by very restrictive firewall configurations, but it provides better overall performance and works much better over congested or slower speed networks. In the end we selected RTSP as our delivery method.

The server

The final piece of the puzzle was creating the streaming video server that would be used to deliver our MPEG4 content via RTSP. There are a number of quality products in today's marketplace, but in the end we selected an open-source product produced as part of Apple's Darwin initiative. The Apple streaming server provides a great set of features, strong performance and best of all it's FREE!

Wrap-up

As you can see quite a bit of effort and planning went into the development of the technical elements of Showcase. However, don't forget that like any project it takes more than just technology to be successful, the Showcase team at NOLA also had to develop a marketing plan, website, promotional materials, coordinate performers, investigate legal issues and much, much more.

Coaching For Superior Performance with Patrick Donadio, March 20, 2003 at the Hilton Garden Inn, Twinsburg

Lima, March 29, 2003 As government funds continue to dwindle, obtaining necessary financial resources becomes more challenging, and perhaps never so vital to the future of libraries. This CAMLS – NOLA, half-day work-shop will provide an overview of many proven fundraising techniques. Both traditional and unorthodox methods will be examined, and fundraising and development professional Kathryn Lima will clarify the roles that directors, trustees, and friends groups can play in raising new dollars.

A spirited, team approach has never been more crucial, so bring the representatives from your Board of Trustees and Friends group. Everyone will leave with a better understanding of how to make the team more effective with new ideas for fundraising and a renewed commitment to success.

Kathryn L. Lima, although trained as a teacher, left the classroom after six years and since has worked in all aspects of marketing, sales, media and fundraising for both for business and nonprofit organizations.





Performers Showcase

The Performers Showcase has been an exciting project to coordinate at NOLA. NOLA has taken the State Library's list of performers and created a database that is searchable and has video clips of many different performers. We have sent letters to over 120 performers and have received over 35 responses including performers that have sent us videos and others who have come to NOLA to have their performances captured.

The Wilcox Curriculum Resource Center, named in honor of the first Dean of the College of Education, Dr. George M. Wilcox, is dedicated to providing means of access to information, equipment, texts, and software to support the research and curriculum of Youngstown State University's Beeghly College of Education. The Wilcox CRC has a diverse range of materials to serve the instructional and research needs of the college's faculty and students, both on and off campus. The Wilcox CRC's collection includes textbooks, children's literature titles, testing instruments, research titles, and a broad range of educational multimedia that range from educational software to puppets. The entire Wilcox CRC collection is cataloged on the main campus library's online catalog, Maagnet. The Wilcox CRC also has an extensive web site, with links to many online resources relating to education, as well as an extensive database for storytelling that has been developed around the activities of the *Penguin Story Tellers' Club*.

As with Maag Library, the Wilcox CRC is part of the OhioLINK consortium. All of the OhioLINK research databases can be accessed, and the Wilcox CRC's research titles are available to all Ohio academic libraries that form OhioLINK. The Wilcox CRC is also part of the NOLA Regional Library System. The Wilcox CRC Librarian, Paul Rohrbaugh, has served on the NOLA Board of Trustees since 1999, and participates in many cooperative educational and library projects. The Wilcox CRC, along with NOLA, has hosted the 2001 and 2002 School Library Symposiums. The Wilcox CRC Librarian, together with members of the *Penguin Story Tellers' Club*, have presented on story telling and children's literature at many local area daycare centers, libraries, schools, *NOLA Book Looks*, both NOLA *School Library Symposiums*, and at many civic organizations' events such as *Boardman Park's Haunted Hayrides*, *Hubbard Schools' Family Literacy Night*, and during Youth Day at the *Canfield Fair*.

The Wilcox CRC Librarian has Masters degrees in Education (YSU, 1981), Library Science (KSU, 1990), and History (YSU, 2001). He received YSU's *Distinguished Service Award* in May, 2002. Besides storytelling and his work in the Wilcox CRC, Paul enjoys doing research on President William McKinley and Joseph G. Butler, as well as going on vacations and attending Pirates games with his wife, Lisa.




Ohio Loves Libraries Week is February 10-16, 2003
